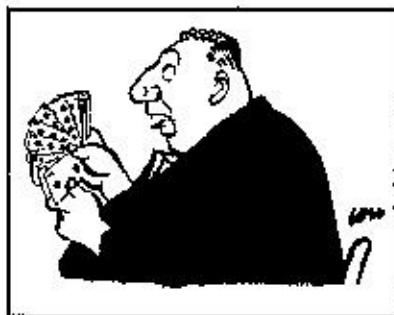

A HISTORY OF THE LEDERER

The Lederer Trophy was presented in 1946 as a tribute to Richard Lederer, and was originally a challenge event between the London's Bridge Clubs. Richard Lederer was a leading international player who ran his own club and contributed greatly to the development of English bridge in its formative years. He won the Gold Cup three times in the 1930s. The cartoon on the front cover is taken from his book *Lederer Bids Two Clubs*, written when he was Bridge Editor of The Sunday Referee. The name of his son, Tony, the first President of the LCCBA (the former name of the LMBA), was added to the dedication after his death by his widow, Rhoda Barrow Lederer, one of the leading bridge teachers of the time.

During the 1970's, teams from outside the capital were often invited to play as guests and in 1977 a Glasgow quartet (including Victor Silverstone and Willie Coyle) won the competition. Over the following years an international flavour was introduced and overseas teams have included Australia, Canada, France, Hungary, Iceland, Ireland, the Netherlands, North America, Norway, Poland and Sweden.

The Lederer Memorial Trophy is one of the strongest tournaments held in England and a list of the winners is displayed at the venue. It is hard to think of a single star of English bridge since the second World War whose name does not appear on it.

A VuGraph room was introduced in 1990 and has become a regular feature. The VuGraph match is also shown live on the Internet through Bridge Base Online.

The Lederer has been developed over the years through the efforts of various organisers. Its staging would not be possible, however, without sponsorship from the Association's President, Bernard Teltscher and from the Young Chelsea Bridge Club. We are most grateful to Bernard, to Warwick Pitch (the tireless secretary of the YC) and to the many club members who help out during the event.



THE TELTSCHER CUPS

A 'Play with the Stars' satellite event was started in 2003. Pairs from other bridge clubs play the first 24 Lederer boards and score up with one of two top Lederer pairs as their team mates. This year the Acol, Hurlingham, Roehampton and Wimbledon Bridge Clubs are again holding heats. The overall North-South and East-West winners will be invited to the prize-giving on Sunday to be presented with the Teltscher Cups.

Dr. Jim Bochslar (partnered by Byron Crittenden and teamed with Andrew Robson & David Bakhshi) won one of the cups last year, playing at Wimbledon Bridge Club. In 1969 Jim was a medical student at King's College Hospital and was secretary of the London University Bridge Club. Tony Lederer came into the hospital to have a leg amputated. Jim recalls introducing himself and taking Tony in his wheelchair round to the medical school student bar to play bridge (and allow Tony to smoke, away from the eagle eye of the ward sister).

1. IRELAND (Holders)

Ireland won the 2004 Lederer by 2 VPs – the smallest margin ever. The defending champions are all in their 30s and were part of the Irish team that finished fifth in the Olympiad in Istanbul last year, losing an exciting quarter final match to the Netherlands, the eventual silver-medallists

Tommy Garvey is an actuary and lives in London. He has won the Scottish Cup (partnering Les Steel) and the English Men's Pairs (with Hugh McGann). He and **John Carroll** first broke through to the Irish Open Team in 1997, while they were still juniors, and have played regularly on the team since then. They have won all of the major Irish domestic events and successes in England include the London Easter Festival Pairs in 2003. John works in computers in Dublin. Tommy and John played as a partnership in the Lederer for the first time last year.

Hugh McGann is a doctor and lives in Harrogate. **Tom Hanlon** works in insurance in Dublin. They have been regular members of the Irish Open Team since 1994, including being members of the victorious Camrose squad in 1999/2000 and 2004/2005. They too have won all the major Irish domestic events, and their successes in England include the Brighton Pairs and the Young Chelsea Marathon. After a few attempts, last year was their first win in the Lederer.

2. PRESIDENT'S TEAM

Bernard Teltcher, Tony Friday,
Willie Coyle, John Matheson,

Bernard Teltcher is President of the LMBA and the major sponsor of the Lederer. He came to the UK in 1938, and gained degrees from University College, London and Trinity College, Cambridge, where in 1946 he was instrumental in restarting the Cambridge Bridge Club which had been dormant during the war. He became its President and played in the first post-war Oxford match. After university he entered the family wine-importing business. Bernard has played bridge for more than seventy years and has won almost all English competitions with the notable exception of the Gold Cup. Bernard is married to *Kitty*, who is playing for the Ladies in this year's Lederer. Fellow octogenarian **Tony Friday** is one of the most illustrious of British bridge players. He was educated at Winchester and reached the rank of major in the army before joining the family wood importing business. He has won numerous National events, including no less than seven Gold Cups. He represented Britain almost continuously from 1960 to 1986, winning gold at the European Championships in 1981 and Bronze in the Bermuda Bowl in 1962. He came out of retirement in 2001 to play with *Nick Sandqvist* for England in the Camrose. Tony is a Vice President of the English Bridge Union and for 36 years was the bridge correspondent of the Sunday Telegraph.

Willie Coyle started his career as a teacher and later moved into school administration. For these services he was awarded the M.B.E. in 2003. Willie has played for Scotland on numerous occasions. He has four Gold Cup wins to his credit, and has played for Great Britain in six European Championships and Olympiads. **John Matheson** lives near Glasgow. He is a retired GP, which gives him more time for bridge and watching cricket on TV. He took up bridge at university and since then has played in forty-eight Camrose matches with a number of different partners.

Victor Silverstone is a six-times Lederer winner. He has represented Great Britain in two European championships, won three Gold Cups and played for Scotland in over two dozen Camrose matches. Despite this he lists his greatest achievement as getting 79.5% at the Acol, playing with his wife. **Chris Dixon** has played for Great Britain (winning a silver medal in the 1971 European Championships) and has been non-playing captain of many English teams. He has won the Gold Cup three times and the Lederer twice. For the past three years he has been Chairman of the EBU Selection Committee. Until recently he owned a computer software company; for twelve years prior to that he owned and ran the Acol Bridge Club.

Geoffrey Breskal was born in 1926 in London so it seemed obvious to the war-time authorities to send him to the Gordon Highlanders, where he reached the rank of Sergeant Major. After spells in the family piano-making business and owning betting shops, he bought and ran the St Johns Wood Bridge Club for twenty years. **David Edwin** is also a Londoner and took up bridge in his early twenties. He became a bridge host and teacher before joining Geoffrey at St Johns Wood. Geoffrey and David, in a variety of partnerships, have won all the major National events and have represented England in Camrose matches.

3. ALL STARS

**Zia Mahmood, John Mohan,
Sabine Auken, Daniela von Arnim**



Zia Mahmood is without doubt the best known bridge player and personality in the world. He is originally from Pakistan, for whom he was a silver medallist in the 1981 Bermuda Bowl. He now divides his time, when not playing or promoting bridge around the globe, between London and New York. He has won many US Nationals and Invitation Tournaments, including the Lederer six times, and he won his first world title at the 2004 Olympiad in Istanbul, partnering **Sabine Auken** in the Transnational Mixed Teams. Zia has written a number of books and is the bridge correspondent of the Guardian. Zia will be playing for the USA Senior team in the World Championships in Estoril, partnering **John Mohan**. John has won over 20 National and International events and was voted ACBL player of the year in 1999. Spurred on by this he won gold medals in both the Seniors Teams and the Mixed Teams in Maastricht in 2000. John is President of Childpledge, Inc., a charitable organisation dedicated to provide funds for starving children worldwide; 90% of donations actually reach the children (www.childpledge.org).

Sabine Auken and **Daniela von Arnim** are from Germany and are widely regarded as Europe's, and perhaps the world's, leading female partnership. Sabine has won two World Championships, three European Teams Championships and four European Pairs Championships, as well as helping Zia win his first gold in Istanbul. In 1989 Sabine broke Jeremy Flint's record by becoming an American Life Master in eight weeks. She was formerly employed in Marketing Financial Products but now lives in Denmark. Daniela began her bridge playing as a teenage substitute at one of her mother's bridge afternoons. She started playing with Sabine at a German Junior Camp and they made their first international appearance together in 1986. Daniela has won two World Championships, one European Teams Championship and three European Pairs Championships. Away from the bridge table she is a software developer. Sabine and Daniela will be playing for Germany in Estoril.

4. ENGLAND

**Tom Townsend, David Gold
David Price, Colin Simpson**



The England team are warming up for the Bermuda Bowl. **Tom Townsend** is a bridge professional. He won the European and World Junior Championships in 1994 and 1995 respectively. Since then he has won every major domestic event at least once, except the Gold Cup ... and the Lederer. Tom and **David Gold** have been a regular partnership since their first time success in the 2000 Brighton Teams. They were part of the team that was unbeaten in the Round Robin stage at the 2004 Olympiad in Istanbul, and they won the Bronze medal in this year's European Pairs in Tenerife. David runs the St. John's Wood Bridge Club and is one of very few players to have played for the England Open team while still a junior.

David Price retired from the commercial rat race a few years ago and now divides his time between professional bridge activities and investment research. He has won many National titles and played for Great Britain in European Championships in 1983. David has also captained Great Britain and England teams. He and **Colin Simpson** were part of the team that played in Malmö (where they made four

redoubled contracts) and qualified for Estoril. Colin retired from a senior position in the Metro-politan Police four years ago. He was an ever-present for the All Stars in their five-year Lederer winning streak. He too has won many National titles and partnered **Gunnar Hallberg** in the England team that came fourth in the 2000 Olympiad.

5. ENGLAND LADIES

**Nicola Smith, Heather Dhondy,
Sally Brock, Kitty Teltscher,
Michelle Brunner, Rhona Goldenfield**



The England Ladies won the bronze medal at the 2004 Olympiad, losing to eventual winners Russia in the semi-finals and beating China in the play-off for third place. They will be playing for the Venice Cup in Estoril. **Nicola Smith** has an unmatched record in English bridge. She first played for the British Ladies team in 1971 and has so far won two Venice Cups, one World Individual and six European Championships, as well as silver and bronze medals too numerous to list. Away from the women's game Nicola has won three Gold Cups. In 1995 she was awarded an MBE for services to bridge, only the second person (after Rixi Markus) to receive such an honour. **Heather Dhondy** is a part-time accountant and part-time bridge professional. She made her first international appearance in 1987 and has been a member of the Ladies team since 1996, winning three European Championships. She has also won one world title, the Transnational mixed teams, in Rhodes in 1996.

Sally Brock also started playing bridge with her family at 14. She made her first international teams appearance in 1979, partnering Sandra Landy and winning the European Championships. She went on to win two Venice Cups and one more European Championship before retiring in 1993 and marrying Raymond Brock. Two children later she returned to international bridge in 2000 and won European gold in 2001. On the national scene Sally has won three Gold Cups. She is a bridge writer and editor, as well as running her own typesetting business. **Kitty Teltscher** was born in Bombay of Hungarian parents and came to England to complete her education. Her bridge background was primarily at the tables of London's rubber bridge clubs and she didn't make her first appearance for England until 2002. The bronze in the Istanbul Olympiad was Kitty's first medal and propelled her into the top 100 in the WBF rankings. She is married to LMBA President **Bernard** and is competing against him in the Lederer for the first time.

Michelle Brunner started playing bridge in London in her early teens and honed her skills at Manchester University where she was meant to be studying for a degree in Italian. She became a bridge professional in 1995. She has written two books and has a devoted following (of bridge students) in the Manchester area. Domestically Michelle has won the Hubert Phillips six times. Internationally she has won gold medals in the World Championships in 1985 and the European Championships in 1979 and 2001. The 2001 win was with her current partner, **Rhona Goldenfield**, who, after playing three times in the Lady Milne, made her first full international appearance in 2000. Rhona was born in Manchester and has lived there all her life. She lists her interests as golf, her six grandchildren, and husband **Bernard**, but we are reliably informed that she also collects handbags.

6. AUSTRALIA Sartaj Hans, Tony Nunn,
Phil Markey, David Horton



The Australian team are in London on their way to the World Championships in Portugal. It would probably be best if we didn't mention the Ashes. **Sartaj Hans** learned the game while looking for an excuse to skip an exam at University. Although he has a regular job (unlike his team-mates) as an IT Analyst in Sydney, he's planning on joining the bridge bum ranks sometime soon. Sartaj played for Australia in the Far East Championships in 2003 and in the 2004 Olympiad where he partnered **Tony Nunn**. Tony is a bridge professional in Sydney and represented Australia in the Far East Championships in 2002. At 27, Tony is the youngest player in this year's Lederer.

The tallest player in this year's event is **Phil Markey**, who is a professional poker player operating mostly online. Phil has partnered **David Horton** for a number of years and together they have won many Australian National events. David learned bridge at the comparatively old age of 24. Before that he was an accomplished 8-ball player (whatever that is). He has recently obtained two university degrees in social planning, but his main source of income is as a bridge and poker professional.

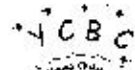
7. SCHAPIRO Geoffrey Wolfarth, Brian Senior
SPRING Valio Kovachev, Vladi Isporski
FOURSOMES



Geoffrey Wolfarth lives in Hove with wife Ros and cat Smudge. He commutes to central London where he works as a solicitor. He is a keen follower of cricket and is an enthusiastic war-gamer, with his own custom-built table. He was a member of the Cambridge University Bridge Club. His main bridge achievements have been winning the English trials and going on to play in the Camrose in 2005, and winning the Spring Foursomes. **Brian Senior** is very well known as a bridge professional. He teaches, writes books and articles, and edits the daily bulletins at major bridge championships. As a player he has represented England, Britain and Northern Ireland, and he has played for the All-Ireland team in European and Olympiad championships. As well as winning National events such as the Gold Cup and the Spring Foursomes, Brian has won many congresses and tournaments all round the world. He is married to Nevena, who has played bridge for both Bulgaria and England.

Geoffrey's and Brian's team-mates are both Bulgarian. As a team they reached the quarter-finals of the main event in the 2003 European Open Championships in Menton. **Valio Kovachev** is a bridge professional and a founder member of the M-Bridge Club in Sophia. He and **Vladi Isporski** have won many National titles in Bulgaria and are regular members of the Bulgarian team. Vladi is a computer professional.

8. YOUNG Janet de Botton, Gunnar Hallberg,
CHELSEA Nick Sandqvist, Artur Malinowski,
CHAMPIONS Jason Hackett, Justin Hackett



Janet de Botton's squad played in the 2004 Lederer as winners of the Schapiro Spring Foursomes. Their major success overseas in the last year was winning the Chairman's Cup in Jönköping, Sweden. Janet has been playing bridge for six years and won her first Congress title in 2003. She is a well-known patron of the arts and was a Trustee of the Tate Gallery for 10 years. **Gunnar Hallberg** is from Sweden, but is now based in England and is a regular at the rubber bridge tables at TGR's. He won the 2004 Cavendish Teams in Las Vegas and won the Lederer four times in a row as part of the All Stars team. Gunnar played with **Colin Simpson** in the England team that came fourth in the 2000 Olympiad.

Nick Sandqvist is also from Sweden, for whom he played as a junior. He came to London in 1994 and won the Gold Cup in 1997. He played for England in the Camrose in 1998, in 2001 (partnering **Tony Priday**) and in 2004 with **Artur Malinowski**. Artur was originally interested in chess, but switched to bridge (which was more suited to his already flamboyant personality) and played for the Poland Junior team. He moved to Norway in 1987 and played for their Open team. He came to England in 2001 and became a bridge professional in 2002.

Jason Hackett and Justin Hackett are two-thirds of the famous Hackett clan. They won the European Junior Championships in 1994 and the World Junior Championships in Bali in 1995. They have played for the Great Britain or England Open team in two Olympiads and three European Championships and will be part of the England team in the World Championships later this month. They are regular winners of tournaments all around the world. Jason is the older twin and became England's youngest ever Grand Master in 1994. Justin is a fanatical Manchester United fan and is married to Barbara Stawowy-Hackett, who will be playing for the German Ladies' team in Estoril, along with **Sabine Auken** and **Daniela von Arnim**.

Twenty of this year's competitors will be going to Estoril next week to take part in the World Championships.
Ten will be playing in the Open Championship for the Bermuda Bowl.
Eight will be playing in the Women's Championship for the Venice Cup.
Two will playing in the Seniors Championship for the Seniors Bowl.



A HAND FROM THE 1986 LEDERER

Colin Simpson and I both missed an opportunity to defeat an ambitious contract on this hand. My partner led ♠Q and declarer won in dummy with ♥K, while East discarded ♠3. At the second trick declarer led a diamond to ♠K, then played a spade to ♠Q and led a second diamond to ♠Q. After these manoeuvres had succeeded he led a third diamond and dis-carded ♥2 from dummy.

East won ♠A and switched to ♠J, but declarer was able to win with ♠K, knock out ♠A and make game with two spades, two hearts, four diamonds and a club.

Although it was difficult to spot at the table, I missed my chance at the first trick. If I had discarded ♠A on ♥Q, declarer would have been unable to make more than eight tricks, for West would have two entries in ♠A and ♠J to set up and enjoy his hearts.

My partner also missed an opportunity. At the third trick he could have risen with ♠A and continued with a high heart. Now it would not be too difficult for me to jettison ♠A, again holding declarer to eight tricks.
