A HISTORY OF THE LEDERER

The Lederer Memorial was first played in 1945 as a tribute to Richard Lederer. It was originally an inter-county competition, but soon became a challenge event between London's Bridge Clubs. Richard Lederer was a leading international player who ran his own club and he contributed greatly to the development of English bridge in its formative years. He won the Gold Cup three times in the 1930s. The cartoon on the right is taken from his book *Lederer Bids Two Clubs*, written when he was Bridge Editor of *The Sunday Referee*.



The name of his son, Tony, the first President of the LCCBA (the former name of the LMBA), was added to the dedication in 1977 by his widow, Rhoda Barrow Lederer, one of the leading bridge teachers of the time.

During the 1970s teams from outside the capital were often invited to play, and in 1977 a Glasgow quartet (including Victor Silverstone and Willie Coyle) won the competition. Over the following years an international flavour was introduced and overseas teams have included Australia, Canada, France, Hungary, Iceland, Ireland, the Netherlands, North America, Norway, Poland and Sweden.

The Lederer Memorial Trophy is one of the strongest tournaments held in England and a list of the winners is displayed at the venue. It is hard to think of a single star of English bridge since World War II whose name does not appear on it.

A VuGraph room was introduced in 1990 and the VuGraph match has been shown live on the Internet for the last four years with Bridge Base Online.

The Lederer has been developed over the years through the efforts of various organisers. Its staging would not be possible, however, without sponsorship from the Association's President, Bernard Teltscher, and support from the Young Chelsea Bridge Club. We are most grateful to Bernard and to the many YC club members who help out during the event.

THE TELTSCHER CUPS

A *Play with the Stars* satellite event was started in 2003 and the Cups were first presented, by Bernard Teltscher, in 2004. Pairs from other bridge clubs play the first 24 Lederer boards on the Saturday, and score up with one of the top Lederer pairs as their team mates.

This year the Acol, Hurlingham, Roehampton and Wimbledon Bridge Clubs are holding heats. The overall North-South and East-West winners will be invited to the prize-giving on Sunday to meet their 'team-mates' and be presented with the Teltscher Cups.

2006 COMPETITORS

1. PRESIDENT'S TEAM

Bernard Teltscher, Tony Priday, Willie Coyle, John Matheson, Victor Silverstone, Chris Dixon



Bernard Teltscher is President of the LMBA and the major sponsor of the Lederer. He came to the UK in 1938, and gained degrees from University College, London and Trinity College, Cambridge, where he was instrumental in restarting the Cambridge Bridge Club after the war. He became its President and played victoriously in the first post-war Oxford match. After university he entered the family wine-importing business. Bernard has played bridge for seventy-six years and has won almost all English competitions, with the notable exception of the Gold Cup. He claims that his greatest achievement is partnering Irving Rose and Jeremy Flint in successive Camrose trials - and failing to qualify with either!

Fellow octogenarian **Tony Priday** is one of the most illustrious of British bridge players. He was educated at Winchester and reached the rank of major in the army before joining the family wood-importing business. He has won numerous National events, including no less than seven Gold Cups. He played in his first Camrose in 1956 and represented Britain almost continuously from 1960 to 1986, winning Gold at the European Championships in 1961 and Bronze in the Bermuda Bowl in 1962. He came out of retirement to play with *Nick Sandqvist* for England in the 2001 Camrose. Tony is a Vice-President of the EBU and for 36 years was the bridge correspondent of the Sunday Telegraph.

Willie Coyle started his career as a teacher and later moved into school administration. For these services he was awarded the M.B.E. in 2003. Willie has played for Scotland on numerous occasions. He has won the Gold Cup five times and has played for Great Britain in six European Championships and Olympiads.

John Matheson lives near Glasgow. He is a retired GP, which gives him more time for bridge and watching cricket on TV. He took up bridge at university and since then has played in over fifty Camrose matches with a number of different partners. He won the Gold Cup in 1973 and 2006, believed to be the longest interval between consecutive wins.

Victor Silverstone is a six-times Lederer winner. He has represented Great Britain in two European championships, has won three Gold Cups and played for Scotland in over two dozen Camrose matches. Victor has won the English Senior knock-out trophy for the last four years. Despite all this he lists his greatest achievement as getting 79.5% at the Acol, playing with his wife.

Chris Dixon has played for Great Britain (winning a Silver medal in the 1971 European Championships) and has been non-playing captain of many English teams. He has won the Gold Cup three times and the Lederer twice. Until recently he owned a computer software company; for twelve years prior to that he owned and ran the Acol Bridge Club. Chris and Victor will be playing for the England Seniors in European Championships in Pau, France in 2008.

2. GOLD CUP WINNERS

Brian Short, Jack Paterson, David Walker, John Murdoch, Malcolm Cuthbertson, Douglas Piper



This is the first all-Scottish team to play in the Lederer since 1998. Their Gold Cup win was a first for all of them (except for *John Matheson* who is playing for the President's Team, and has been replaced by in the team by *Jack Paterson*, who won the Gold Cup in 1980). They all seem to have partnered each other over the years and have all played for Scotland in numerous Camrose matches.

Brian Short is a retired Life Insurance company director and Management Consultant. He has won all the major Scottish events, including the Scottish Cup 7 times. He played for Great Britain (with *Sandy Duncan*) several times in the 70s and 80s. More recently Brian has played for Scotland in the Olympiad and European Championships with *Jack Paterson*.

Jack Paterson is also retired from the Life Assurance industry where he worked in Investment Management. For many years he partnered the late *Ken Baxter*. For health reasons he has recently been acting as a NPC, but a full recovery means he is now back in the competitive fray. Jack is making his first appearance in the Lederer.

Malcolm Cuthbertson works in the Life Assurance industry in Edinburgh, and some years back was half of Scotland's top pair when playing with *Andrew McIntosh*, who now plays his bridge in England. He enjoys watching sport and travelling to the cultural centres of Europe and beyond. Malcolm has represented Scotland in the European Championships, partnering *David Walker*.

David Walker teaches mathematics in a secondary school and has a low single figure handicap at golf. He and Malcolm won the Welsh invitational pairs in 2005. This is his third Lederer.

John Murdoch is a librarian in Glasgow, and also has some trade union interests. He has played for Scotland in the European championships, twice in the Open team and twice for the Seniors, and also in the Olympiad Open team in Istanbul in 2004.

Douglas Piper is a bridge teacher living and working in Edinburgh. He has represented Scotland in recent World events, playing with John.

Fourteen of this year's competitors are previous winners of the Lederer.

Victor Silverstone has won six times (one behind the outright leader, Zia Mahmood). Tony Priday (who first won in 1960) and Colin Simpson have both won five times, Gunnar Hallberg has won four times.

Table 1 is the closed VuGraph room (and is located in the Henley House Hotel, next door to Young Chelsea Bridge Club).

Tables 2, 3 and 8 are in the Upstairs playing area.

Tables 4, 5, 6 and 7 are in the Downstairs playing area.

Each match in the Lederer is 12 boards
and the scoring is part IMPs and part point-a-board.

The normal IMP score for the 12 boards is converted to Victory Points, with a maximum of 36 VPs. A further 24 VPs are available from point-a-board (2 for a win, 1 for a draw). Thus the total number of VPs per match is 60.

The eight team format with IMP & point-a-board scoring, with 60 VPs per match and an average final score of 210 VPs, began in 1987.

The highest winning score is 296 by the 2002 All Stars.

The lowest winning score is 240 by the 2001 All Stars

3. IRELAND

**Tommy Garvey, David Bakhshi,
Hugh McGann, Tom Hanlon**



The Irish quartet (with John Carroll partnering Tommy Garvey) have gone from strength to strength since winning the 2004 Lederer by 2 VPs - the smallest margin ever. They have finished fifth in the 2004 Olympiad in Istanbul, successfully defended their Lederer crown and won three consecutive Camrose trophies. Their greatest achievement so far came last year when they won the Silver medal in the European Championships in Warsaw (excellently documented in the book *Silver for Ireland*, runner-up as the IBPA's bridge book of the year).

Tommy Garvey is an actuary and lives in London. As well as winning all the major Irish domestic events, he has won the Scottish Cup (with Les Steel) and the English Men's Pairs (with Hugh McGann) and the London Easter Festival Pairs in 2003 (with John Carroll). **David Bakhshi** (of the Cahirciveen Bakhshis) is a late substitute for John Carroll. He is a bridge professional and the main teacher at the Andrew Robson Bridge Club. He had a successful partnership with Andrew, winning the Gold Cup in 2002 and 2004, and representing England in the 2004 Olympiad. David came 6th in the World Pairs Final in 2006, playing with *Andrew McIntosh*. He has a regular column in *English Bridge*.

Hugh McGann is a doctor and lives in Harrogate. **Tom Hanlon** works in insurance in Dublin. They have been regular members of the Irish Open Team since 1994. They were part of the victorious Camrose squad in 1999/2000, Ireland's first win since rejoining the Camrose, and the beginning of the resurgence in Irish bridge. Their successes in England include the Brighton Pairs (twice) and the Young Chelsea Marathon. Hugh and Tom played for Europe against the USA in the inaugural Buffet Cup (the bridge equivalent to the Ryder Cup) in Dublin in 2006.

4. EUROPEAN MIXED TEAM CHAMPIONS

**Jeremy and Heather Dhondy
Lilo and Matilda Popilov**



This is the quartet that won the Mixed Teams event at the European Open Bridge Championships in Antalya, Turkey in June 2007.

Jeremy Dhondy is a Geography teacher. He was born in North London and started playing bridge at school, and with his father. He has won many domestic trophies, including the Hubert Phillips and the Grand Masters, twice. He has played for England in Camrose matches. Jeremy is involved in bridge administration with the EBU and writes a regular column for *English Bridge*. Alas, there is not enough space for his Omar Sharif anecdote. Do ask him about it.

Heather Dhondy is an accountant as well as a professional bridge player, teacher and writer. She won the World Mixed Teams in Rhodes in 1996 and then the European Championships three times (in 1997 and 1999 with Liz McGowan as part of the Great Britain team, and in 2001 for England, playing with Nicola Smith). She also partnered Nicola in the England Women's team that won the bronze medal at the 2004 Olympiad in Istanbul. In addition, Heather has won a record 13 Lady Milne trophies over the past 17 years.

Lilo Popilov graduated from the Academy of Arts in Bulgaria and moved to Israel in 1990. He works as a graphic designer and is a part-time bridge professional. He is a graphic designer for Israeli bridge and chess books and magazines and for many years has conducted the "Bid with the experts" column. Lilo played for the Israeli Open team in the 2000 Olympiad.

Matilda Popilov is computer programmer in the Israeli Electric Company and a part-time bridge professional. Playing for Bulgaria many times, including winning European Gold in the Women's Pairs in 1987 and bronze in the 1988 Olympiad. Since her move to Israel in 1990 she has played for the Israeli Open and Women's teams. She also won a silver medal in the Women's Teams in Antalya. Matilda is on the Israeli Bridge Federation executive committee, writes a monthly column and is in the publishing team of the Israeli Bridge Magazine.

5. CROCKFORDS

**Janet de Botton, David Burn,
Nick Sandqvist, Artur Malinowski,
Jason Hackett, Justin Hackett**



Janet de Botton's squad are playing in their fourth consecutive Lederer; the first was as winners of the Spring Foursomes, then as Young Chelsea Champions and last year as Gold Cup winners. Janet has been playing bridge for eight years. She added to her impressive list of titles by winning the Hubert Phillips in 2007 (with Artur, Nick and Justin). She was a bronze medallist in the recent European Open Mixed Teams (with Artur, Nick and Nevena Senior). She is a well-known patron of the arts and was a Trustee of the Tate Gallery for 10 years.

David Burn wears more bridge hats than anybody else - as well as being an international player (finishing fourth in the 2000 Olympiad), he is the current coach to the English Open team and has just returned from coaching the England Ladies team in the world championships in Shanghai. He also does VuGraph commentaries, writes, and still finds time to sit on the EBU's L&E Committee.

Nick Sandqvist is originally from Sweden, for whom he played as a junior. He came to London in 1994 and won the Gold Cup in 1998. He won the Welsh Open Pairs in 2007 and was a silver medallist in the European Open Pairs in Antalya, both in partnership with Artur Malinowski.

Artur Malinowski was originally interested in chess, but switched to bridge (which was more suited to his already flamboyant personality) and played for the Poland Junior team. He moved to Norway in 1987 and played for their Open team. He came to England in 2001 and became a bridge professional in 2002.

Jason Hackett and **Justin Hackett** won the European Junior Championships in 1994 and the World Junior Championships in Bali in 1995. They have played for the Great Britain or England Open team in two Olympiads and three European Championships. Jason is the older twin and became England's youngest ever Grand Master in 1994. Justin is a fanatical Manchester United fan and is married to Barbara Hackett, who plays for the German Ladies team. Jason and Justin played for Europe in the inaugural Buffett Cup last year.

**6. SCHAPIRO SPRING

Neil Rosen manages and teaches at the Ace of Clubs in north London (having previously managed the Acol as well). He has won the Gold Cup twice, the Spring Foursomes four times, and played for England in numerous Camrose matches. **Neil and Martin Jones** were part of the team that retained the Spring Foursomes Trophy in 2007. **Martin** was for many years the partner of **John Collings**, with whom he won two Gold Cups. He was (non-playing!) captain of the England Ladies team that won the Bronze medal in the European Championships in Warsaw in 2006.

Andrew ("Tosh") McIntosh represented Scotland many times but, following bridge devolution, he now lives in London and has transferred his allegiance to England. He has the rare distinction of having won the Gold Cup three years in a row (and four times in five years). He came 6th in the World Pairs Final in 2006, playing with **David Bakshi**. **Tosh** now manages the Acol Bridge Club. **Gunnar Hallberg** is from Sweden for whom he played in the mid-80s. Playing for England he came fourth in the Maastricht Olympiad in 2000. He won the Gold Cup in 2005 and the prestigious Vanderbilt Trophy in America in 2006.

David Price retired from the commercial rat race a few years ago and now divides his time between professional bridge activities and property renovation. He first played for Great Britain in the European Championships in 1983, and then he and **Colin** played for England in the European Championships in 2004 and 2006 and the Bermuda Bowl in Estoril in 2005. **Colin Simpson** retired from a senior position in the Metropolitan Police six years ago. He was an ever-present for the All Stars in their five-year Lederer winning streak. He also partnered **Gunnar Hallberg** in the England team that came fourth in the 2000 Olympiad.

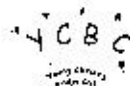
Keith Stanley is Gloucestershire's all-time highest ranked player. He has won the Gold Cup twice, the Spring Foursomes five times, and the Lederer. He lists his other interests as music, wine, food and marriage. **Richard Chamberlain** is a college lecturer, teaching mathematics in Swindon. His bridge successes include winning the Pachabo and Garden Cities twice and the National Swiss teams. Outside of bridge, **Richard** is a keen mountain walker who especially enjoys the Scottish mountains. He met his wife in the far north of Norway.

Andrew Kambites is a retired Maths teacher and now has time to spend on numerous bridge activities. He has written 20 bridge books and has columns in *Bridge Plus* and *English Bridge*. He is an EBU Tournament Director and has taught many juniors, including (from the age of 11) **John Atthey**. **John** first play-ed for the England under 20 team aged 15. He now plays for the England Junior (under 25) team. He has won EBU awards for Young Player and Young Pair of year. At 16 **John** was the youngest ever player to appear in a Tollemache final, winning the bronze medal. He is hopeless at answering emails.

Joe Angseesing is a recently retired Lecturer in Geology and Environmental Science. He has been a regular member of Gloucestershire's Tollemache team for over 25 years. He founded and runs a small bridge club in Cheltenham and has spent 10 years as Gloucestershire's Chief Tournament Director. **Graham Sadie** learned to play bridge from enthusiastic grandparents, playing for a penny a hundred. He has enjoyed Gloucestershire's bronze, silver and gold medals in the Tollemache over the past few years. He initiated a local newspaper's bridge column and has served county bridge in various capacities.

**8. YOUNG CHELSEA

Steve Popham has a PhD in Mathematical logic and is computer consultant. His main claim to bridge fame (other than reaching the final of Crockfords) is sharing a student flat with **Andrew Robson** - and surviving! **Adrian Scheps** has PhD in History and is a lawyer, although he is now building up a metals trading and processing business. He has been an also-ran in far too many bridge events, until winning the YC knockout! He is passionate about cricket, music and his family, and doesn't think sleep is something one needs.

Mike Vail is retired, after a career in Research & Development with Glaxo. He has won the Tollemache four times with Middlesex, twice as non-playing captain. He is a keen angler. **Jerry Harouni** is a director of a number of property investment companies. He has won the Tollemache with Middlesex, the National Pairs (twice) and more than his fair share of lesser tournaments. **Norman Selway** is a rare beast indeed - a retired rubber bridge player. He has won many bridge events, including Crockfords (twice), the Spring Foursomes (three times) and the 1985 Lederer, playing for the Professionals.

Nigel Bird and Malcolm Todd played a vital part in helping the team win the YC Knock-Out, but they had booked their holidays without taking into account that they might win the event and qualify to play in the Lederer!
